Reporting:

Social media sites are great tools - BUT - if you do NOT report a crime to OPD- OPD cannot focus efforts in that area. Please encourage your neighbors to gather as much information as possible (license plate #s, specific times, make/model of vehicles, person description, etc.) and call 911/TRS/Mayor's Hotline.

Emergency: 911

Telephone Report Squad (TRS):

If the call is "cold", meaning there are no suspects/ the crime is completed, you are always able to call the TRS and they will take your report over the phone. Typically you will be instructed to leave a message, and the call taker will contact you back. If you are unsure if it is a TRS call or a 911 call, defer to 911 and they will advise you on the best course of action.

Non-emergency line:

Options when calling this #: file report over phone, speak to detective on a previously reported crime, handgun registration information, obtaining copy of police report, information about someone in Douglas County Corrections, speak to an officer 402-444-5600

Mayor's Hotline:

The hotline staff fields reports on abandoned vehicles, potholes, graffiti, code violations, neighborhood speeding complaints and many other citizen concerns. The Hotline has established contacts with OPD, OFD, City Parks & Rec, OPPD, MUD, The Nebraska Humane Society, the Nebraska Department of Roads and Douglas County to provide service to Omaha residents.

Traffic Calming Program:

The Traffic Engineering Division oversees the placement and maintenance of traffic calming measures, including active devices, passive devices, preemptive tools for new developments, and retrofitting tools for existing neighborhoods. Examples of some traffic calming devices used by the City include (but are not limited to) speed humps, speed tables, raised crosswalks, and traffic circles.
